DIRECTOR'S NOTE

I met Amena Shehab in 2015 in Edmonton, a city to which we had both recently relocated -- me in 2014 from Toronto, her in 2013 after the war broke out in Syria with her three children. I could go on forever about her fiery, insistent passion for theatre; her riotous and risqué sense of humour; her cooking. But suffice it to say we formed a strong and supportive bond that eventually resulted in the first production of Hagar in 2018.

Amena and I have brought to this project our shared but vastly different experiences as mothers of young children. When I first read the script, it was the evening before my own son's first birthday, and the character's raw determination, loneliness, and grief so resonated with me on that day that I had to put it down. I texted Amena and said, "I can't finish this right now, but I'm in."

How can people there imagine the face of just one mother who sees her child murdered?

Hagar asks this of Europeans, of white North American settlers. And the answer is we can't, and we don't want to, because it is a living nightmare. And so the focus of our storytelling on stage is to lay bare the specific and unique experiences of women and mothers living through war. While much of the staging is symbolic and theatrical, specific touches of realism that are recognizable to mothers everywhere --the careful way we move around a baby's crib to make sure they are safe without waking them, the constant and automatic swaying and rocking, the way we stare in awe at their quiet faces once they are finally asleep--have been woven throughout.

The devastating coincidence of presenting this play in the context of the atrocities being inflicted upon Gaza over the last several weeks is not lost on us. While the work was originally created in response to the Syrian refugee crisis, we have continued and will continue to see families violently displaced and disrupted by war and oppression. We invite you to consider this play in the context of the present moment, but also in the context of Ukrainians who have sought refuge; of the women's liberation movements in Iran and Afghanistan; in the continued separation of Indigenous mothers and their babies here in Canada.

We thank you for getting into the boat alongside Hagar today, and for bearing witness to the story of just one mother.

Morgan continues to perform as a founding member of BoylesqueTO, Canada's premiere "Boylesque" troupe, where she emcees under the stage name Balonia Wry.

Amena Shehab is an Arab-Canadian actress and playwright who has brought her captivating journey to Edmonton's theatre scene. Her solo performance in Hagar (Alma Theatre) poignantly depicts a Syrian refugee experience. Amena has also embodied Sammar in F.O.B and Nahla in Harun for the Edmonton Fringe. Other credits include E-Day (The Serial Collective), Rehearsal (Syrian Heritage Association), All That Binds Us (Azimuth Theatre), and Here There Be Night (Workshop) West). An accomplished Arab playwright and actress, Amena's migration to Canada ignited her passion for storytelling. From The Amazonamachy (Tiger Heart's Collective) to The Shoe Project coordinator (Workshop West and Skirts-A-Fire), she empowers newcomer women and enriches Edmonton's cultural landscape. Amena also received the Lieutenant Governor of Alberta Arts Awards: Creative Encouragement Award, 2023.
